## The 2020 Census



The 2020 census is a real current event that is going on right now in our country. ## The 2020 Census

Every ten years, or <u>decade</u>, America takes a <u>census</u> to count the number of people living in the nation. This year census day is April 1. The census impacts how <u>tax</u> money is used, the number of <u>representatives</u> for the state and nation, and the amount of <u>electoral</u> votes each state receives for voting. It is part of our democratic government process.

In the census, people are mailed a <u>survey</u>, or list of questions, in the middle of March. Each member living in the household is counted, including children and babies. Then the survey is returned in the mail. Census workers receive the survey, count the numbers, and save the information. This year people can also respond to the census survey by Internet or phone.

The census this year is in the year 2020. The next census will be in 2030, then 2040. It is updated every ten years. Ten years is a decade. 'Deca' means ten.


